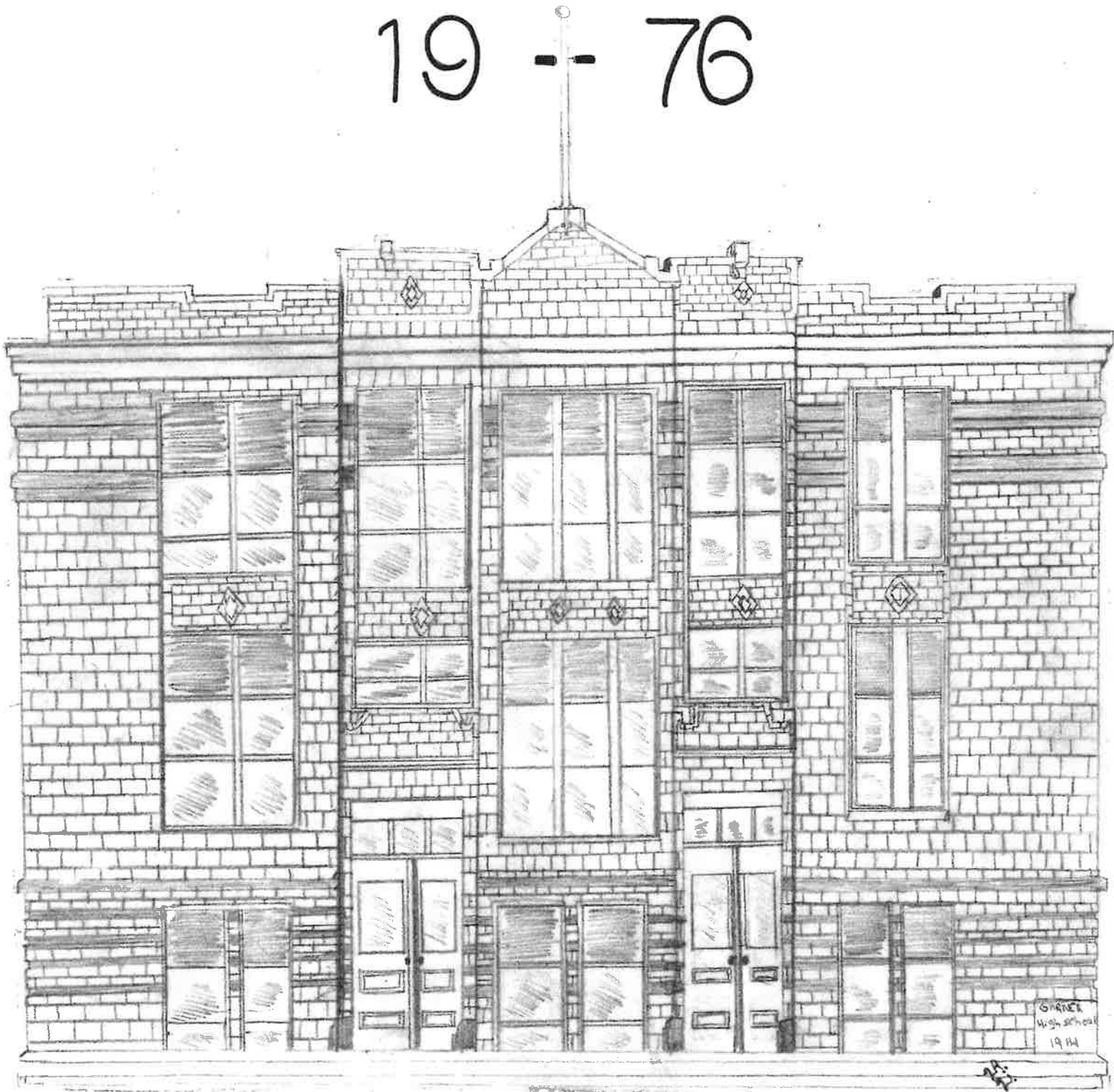

School Board Member

A school board member's salary is free donation of time. The only time the school district pays is when they have to travel a long ways. Their term is three years. There are five board members. One in the North, Norm Gurdle. One in the middle, which is Diamine Paka, and one in the South, Alan De Witte. These are all rural. There are also two serving in town, one in the west, Dr. Fuller, and one in the east, Dr. Johnson. There is also an elected secretary and treasurer. They are Bill Jempletton and Spence Olenburg. Their election is held every September on the second Tuesday of that month.

What does a School Board Member do?

They always try to make the best decisions for the welfare of the students of each school district.

They represent the people. They also have to hire the administration (principal, superintendant) through recommendation of the superintendant they finalize the hiring of teachers, aids, cooks, secretary, custodian, and busdrivers. All expenses and major decisions of program and equipment are approved here.

Why did Diamine want to become a Board Member? First of all she thought education was a foundation for the welfare of our country in the future.

Second, because she was a teacher and a graduate of Garner-Wayfield she felt she owed her knowledge of education to the welfare of the students.

How does she feel being the only woman on the board? Because a woman plays a large part of education she felt a woman should be represented. She also felt that a woman has more compassion and understanding of a emotional child that is in trouble. Also through a building project a man has more knowledge but a woman has more concern over things being functional and workable.
