I interviewed a Senior citizen of Garner, Frank Formanek.

He was born in 1906 on a farm near Hayfield. He walked a mile and a half to school for eight years. He usually cut across the fields. Their school was Garfield 5. While he was there, those 8 years, his teachers were Carl Hude, Mrs. George Heylib, Mrs. Crawl, and Frances Popovich.

In school they ~~the~~ played games like gray wolf, London Bridge, and Anti-d-over. They had spell-downs and a Basket Socials. That was where all the girls bring a basket of food, they lined them up, and the boy who pays the most for it, gets to eat lunch with that girl. Sometimes a basket would get up to 30 dollars.

Things were alot cheaper then. Shows were 25¢, pop 5¢, sandwiches 15¢, cars 500\$, and prunes 5¢ a pound.

The boys usually wore overhauls, a gray sweater, and duck coats for \$3.75. To church they wore pants up to the knees, six button shoes, and when they reached 15 they could wear long pants.

For tools they used walking cultivators and hoes. They picked 160 acres of corn by hand.

For entertainment, they went out to shows and dances after they were 18.

The kids used to go to church lessons one hour on Saturday. They were held at the train depot and the priest was the teacher.

For meals they usually had meat fried in lard, potatoes, prunes, and an apple. For breakfast they had pancakes and bacon or oatmeal.

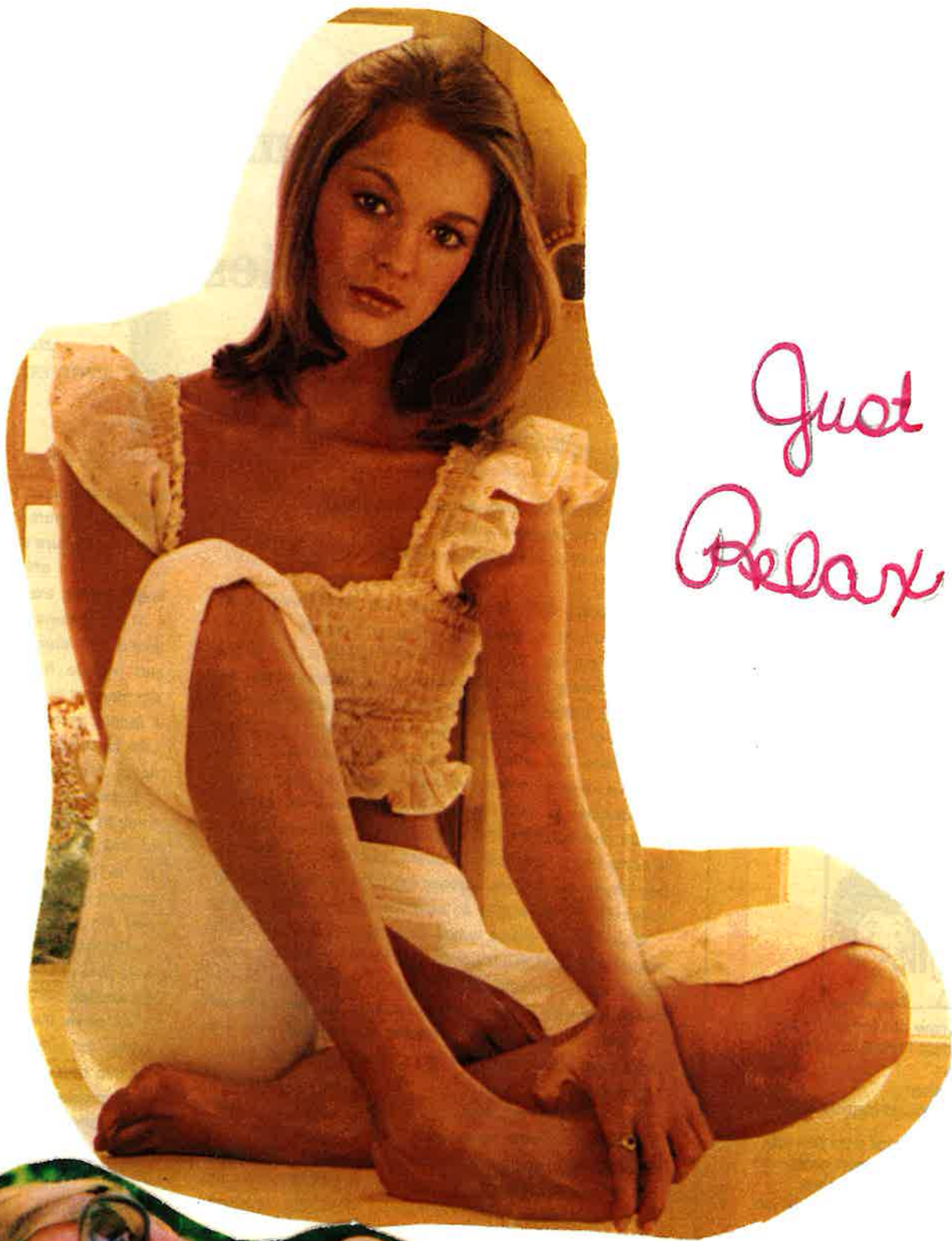

It had 150 ft. of Linch hose on a reel, 400 ft. of 1 1/2 inch hose, and 600 ft. of 2 1/2 hose, (some of the hoses are still in use today). It also had 2 soda acid fire extinguishers and various other fire fighting equipment. It had a Dodge 6 cylinder, 120 horsepower engine.

In the past, after it was retired it pumped sewers until 1969 when the firemen restored it for the bi-centennial.

Since then it has been used for to give children rides and parades.

A news sign on it which reads:
